-- Median Debt Level: The Median Debt Levels reported are those which are at the middle of the distribution of all values of debt in the group of students who completed the certificate program in the 2010/11 award year (July 1 - June 30).

Note regarding disclosure of Placement Rates: The Department of Education waives the disclosure of Placement Rates if the institution is not required by its accreditor or state agency to calculate such rates. Neither Middle States Commission on Higher Education (UCCC's accreditor) nor New York State requires the calculation of such rates.
